Angelo Butler-Ricks Leaves His Imprint in Our Community

Known for his striking blue eyes and friendly demeanor, Angelo Butler-Ricks left a huge hole in our community. His recent passing made us realize how much he contributed to the Deaf community and here at GCDHH. Born and raised in Orange Park, Florida, Angelo was known by many of his childhood friends as Mike or Micheal. In 2005, he moved to Atlanta to find his creative freedom. Here, he became well known as Angelo, the dancer, chef, poet, entrepreneur, Deaf interpreter, ASL instructor and activist.

Most people met Angelo through his long-standing ASL Jams Night, a monthly gathering for people to watch his poetry performances and sometimes partake in it. With his facial expressions and hands, he captivated audiences on subjects that were personal to him such as gun violence, romance, and acceptance. Angelo was an extraordinary choreographer where he went above and beyond. One of his most memorable performance was at IKOUII where he danced in orange

powder, his body swaying harmonically, lifting his hands in the air as he was waiting for someone to lift him up toward the sky. No one took their eyes off him that night.

He was also a devoted friend. At his memorial, we learned that Angelo has individually impacted people for the better. People are better interpreters because of him. People are now living and recovered from mental health crisis because of him. People went after their dreams when he encouraged them. All because of Angelo. His good energy was infectious, and it was obvious he was a shining light in whatever room he walked into.

Above all, Angelo considered his daughter his biggest pride and joy. He gushed about her when he spoke to friends. It was clear that she was always on his mind and dearly loved her.

Despite his positive energy, Angelo was vocal about unjust issues such as Black Lives Matters, LGBTIQ, and Deaf issues. You would often see him making vlogs expressing his feelings. Angelo would also find himself at protests to unite with others about the inequality of the system. His passion to help the community benefited GCDHH when he presented ideas of how we can provide better services. He pointed out an audience we could greatly impact. He wasn't just about doing his job, he made sure he was going beyond.

He might be gone, but his memory lives on forever. Next time you see a person dancing on the street or if you see a random smile from a stranger, think of Angelo. It just might be him working his magic to make your day a little better. Rest in Peace Angelo Butler-Ricks.

Do You Have Hearing Loss!

We've got you covered! You may qualify for no-cost equipment from <u>Georgia</u> <u>Telecommunications Equipment Distribution Program</u>.



Prior to COVID-19, Georgia Center of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (GCDHH) offered American Sign Language (ASL) Courses in-person at the center. When the pandemic started, GCDHH took a new approach with virtual classes for ASL to respect safety concerns. Today, remote classes are available for the community (age 14 and up) and businesses. Below are *upcoming* available courses:

ASL II - Beginner
ASL III - Intermediate
ASL IIII - Advanced

ASL IV - Advanced+

*There will be eight two-hour-long classes each semester.

The textbook is highly recommended for all ASL units-A Basic Course in American Sign Language (Second Edition). This can be ordered via Amazon. GCDHH offers online ASL classes for children younger than 14 years old for one hour for eight sessions. We also offer private ASL one-on-one for a separate fee. At the end of the semester, a Certificate of Attendance will be given for those who participated. This is only for the proof of participation in ASL course and this does not count as certified for Sign Language Interpreter. If you wanted to become a certified interpreter, you would have to take Interpreting courses at any college/university that offers them.
